Identity theft and the password problem

Dr. Jeffrey Patin, founder and CEO of JP CyberTech, Inc., will talk to our group on August 12 about how we can prevent identity theft and create secure passwords using Enigma II, an advanced encoding software. Research has shown password and identity theft to be one of the fastest growing crimes in the country, yet people have been slow to implement important safety measures on their computers to protect themselves from unauthorized users. In addition, many people tend to lose track or recycle the same passwords and personal ID for their bank accounts, credit card PINs, and other sensitive information.

Having your passwords stolen can compromise your financial and personal information and allow others to use that information to profit from your loss.

Creating hard-to-guess passwords can provide greater security but can result in users writing their password down on notepads, planners or on post-it notes near their computers. This in turn creates even easier accessibility for unauthorized users to obtain your personal information. Regularly changing your password can help lessen unwanted access to your private information, but trying to remember your latest password could be a nuisance.

Unfortunately, passwords can be guessed, and cracking easy passwords is mere child's play with the many password-cracking programs that are easily available for downloading. The time and cost of recovering losses from unauthorized use of your information can be daunting. According to the Internet

Identity theft statistics

The rate of identity theft soared nearly 80% over the past year, affecting 3.4% of all adult consumers, The Gartner Groups said in July.

Fully 7 million U.S. consumers were victimized by identity thieves during the year ending in June. "The growth rate in identity theft from 2002 to 2003 is staggering," according to Gartner analyst Avivah Litan.

However, for various reasons, ID thieves face only a one-in-700 chance of being caught, Litan said.

Most identity crimes are not committed on the Internet, but by information stolen by someone you know, pickpockets, and U.S. mail interception. But Litan said, "The Internet plays a large role in payment fraud. Thieves go after high volumes of credit-card numbers, then sell or barter those numbers through chat rooms."

Theft Resource Center, victims of fraud can spend over 175 hours restoring their reputation — by notifying credit bureaus, canceling credit cards and negotiating with creditors. Is there a solution to prevent the password problem? A few years ago, Microsoft unveiled Passport, a security Internet service which allowed users to store their username and passwords on the Internet. But on September 2002 a Passport security flaw left 200 million consumer accounts vulnerable to hackers and thieves. So what can you do?

One answer to the problem is Enigma II, designed by Dr. Patin. Users only have to remember one master phrase, making them less vulnerable to human factors that can jeopardize security. And, Enigma II's user interface is designed for speed and simplicity. Buttons on the main window are self-explanatory and there are no intricate menus. See info at <http://www.jpicybertech.com/>

Two critical Microsoft Windows vulnerabilities found in July

MS03-027 — Affects Windows NT, Windows 2000, Windows 2003 Server, and Windows XP. A worm using this vulnerability would find more than ten times as many potential victims as Code Red. If an efficient worm is launched, so many infected systems will be searching for victims that you will not be able to download the patches before being infected. <http://www.microsoft.com/technet/security/bulletin/MS03-027.asp>

MS03-030 — Affects all Windows systems running DirectX. Any application that uses DirectX/DirectShow to process MIDI files may be affected by this vulnerability. Of particular concern, Internet Explorer (IE) uses the Windows Media Player ActiveX control and quartz.dll to handle MIDI files embedded in HTML documents. An attacker could therefore exploit this vulnerability by convincing a victim to view an HTML document, such as a web page or an HTML email message, that contains an embedded MIDI file.

Beware! Worm masquerades as Microsoft patch

A new e-mail worm is beginning to spread on the Internet and over the Kazaa peer-to-peer network TruSecure Corp, an antivirus company, announced. "Gruel" is a mass-mailing worm that masquerades as a Windows software patch from Microsoft Corp. and as a virus removal tool from Symantec Corp.

Gruel spreads by stealing e-mail addresses from an infected computer's Microsoft Outlook address book and mailing copies of itself to those addresses, but it also deletes files from machines it infects. It copies itself into various locations, including folders used by the Kazaa file-sharing network, enabling it to spread on that network as well.

Home users without up-to-date antivirus software will likely bear the brunt of the new worm. It is expected that infections on unprotected home systems may bombard corporate mail gateways with infected messages. —LG

Avoid getting hooked by a “phishing” scam

Internet scammers casting about for people’s financial information have a new way to lure unsuspecting victims: They go “phishing.”

Phishing, also called “carding,” is a high-tech scam that uses spam to deceive consumers into disclosing their credit card numbers, bank account information, Social Security numbers, passwords, and other sensitive information.

According to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC), the emails pretend to be from businesses the potential victims deal with — for example, their Internet service provider (ISP), online payment service or bank. The fraudsters tell recipients that they need to “update” or “validate” their billing information to keep their accounts active, and direct them to a “look-alike” Web site of the legitimate business, further tricking consumers into thinking they are responding to a bona fide request. Unknowingly, consumers submit their financial information - not to the businesses — but the scammers, who use it to order

goods and services and obtain credit.

To avoid getting caught by one of these scams, the FTC, the nation’s



consumer protection agency, offers this guidance:

- If you get an email that warns you, with little or no notice, that an account of yours will be shut down unless you reconfirm your billing information, do not reply or click on the link in the email. Instead, contact the company cited in the email using a telephone number or Web site address you know to be genuine.

- Avoid emailing personal and financial information. Before submitting financial information through a Web site, look for the “lock” icon on the browser’s status bar. It signals that your information is secure during transmission.

- Review credit card and bank account statements as soon as you receive them to determine whether there are any unauthorized charges. If your statement is late by more than a couple of days, call your credit card company or bank to confirm your billing address and account balances.

- Report suspicious activity to the FTC. Send the actual spam to uce@ftc.gov. If you believe you’ve been scammed, file your complaint at www.ftc.gov, and then visit the FTC’s Identity Theft Web site (www.ftc.gov/idtheft) to learn how to minimize your risk of damage from identity theft.

- Visit www.ftc.gov/spam to learn other ways to avoid email scams and deal with deceptive spam. The Federal Trade Commission works for the consumer to prevent fraudulent, deceptive and unfair business practices in the marketplace and to provide information to help consumers spot, stop and avoid them. To file a complaint or to get free information on consumer issues, visit www.ftc.gov or call toll-free, 1-877-FTC-HELP (1-877-382-4357); TTY: 1-866-653-4261. The FTC enters Internet, telemarketing, identity theft and other fraud-related complaints into *Consumer Sentinel*, a secure, online database available to hundreds of civil and criminal law enforcement agencies in the U.S. and abroad.

Make long URLs into tinyURLs

Don’t you hate it when you copy a URL (Internet address) from your Web browser and send it to someone, only to get an email back saying “I clicked on that URL and it said the site wasn’t there!” The problem isn’t that the site is gone, the problem is that your email program broke up the URL so that it was split across lines. The broken URL didn’t work for the person you sent the mail to and they complain to you! Those days are over if you use tinyURL. Just enter your long URL into the tinyURL box, and you’ll get a URL that anyone can click on.

Example

Turn this URL: <http://urbanlegends.about.com/sitesearch.htm?terms=lost%20boy&SUName=urbanlegends&TopNode=3042&type=1>

Into a tinyURL — <http://tinyurl.com/i45f>

You can add a tinyURL button to your browser’s toolbar so changing a long URL into a short URL becomes automatic!

Tweak your fonts in Word

If you need to fit text in a tight space, sometimes the 8-point font is too large to fit and the 7-point font is too small to read. What to do?

Did you know you can choose a font size that's halfway between 7-point and 8-point?

Here's how: Select Font from the Format menu. Then, on the Font tab, type 7.5 in the Size box and click OK. This tip works with any size True Type font up to 250.5! And, it works in Excel, too.

Make menus show a complete list of items

Out of the box, Office 2000 and Office XP display just the commands that you use most often on their "personalized" menus. But, if you want to see all of the commands instantly, like you could in Office 97, it is easy to turn back the clock to simpler times.

Click on the Tools menu. Click Customize, and then click the Options tab. Click to check the box next to "Always Show Full Menus."

Find your computer's IP address

Connect to the Internet. Go to Start and click on Run. Type in *windowsipconfig.exe* to get your computer's IP address. The address is in four full or partial sets of numbers separated by periods, such as 255.255.255.255. You'll need them when you connect your system to other computers on the Internet and for some firewall programs when you setup a peer-to-peer system. —LG

Create a desktop reboot icon

You can create a desktop icon in **Windows 98** to reboot your computer. You can activate it with a normal left-double-click instead of "Start," "Shutdown," "Restart."

(There is a free utility available at <http://www.optimumx.com/download/> that can be downloaded for other Win OS versions, including Win98.)

Right-click on an empty area of your desktop, then left-click "New" and then "Shortcut". In the command line of the dialog box type "C:\WINDOWS\RUNDLL32.EXE Shell32.dll,SHExitWindowsEx 2"

(without the quote marks). Left-click "NEXT" and name the shortcut whatever you like. (I named mine "Reboot Windows.") Click "Finish," and the icon will be on the desktop with a default icon.

If you want to assign a different icon, place the mouse arrow over the icon and right-click. Left-click "Properties." The dialog box will have a button for "Change Icon." Left-click the button and then type in "C:\WINDOWS\SYSTEM\PIFMGR.DLL" (again without the quote marks).

Left-click the icon you want from the ones displayed, it will be highlighted, and then left-click "OK." (Other icons are also available in C:\WINDOWS\Moricons.dll if you don't like any in the original group.)

Move the icon to your preferred position on the desktop. If you left-double-click the icon, your computer will restart itself.

FYI, "C:\WINDOWS\RUNDLL32.EXE Shell32.dll,SHExitWindowsEx 1" (note the last character is "1", not "2" as in the command above) will cause a shutdown and power-off instead of a reboot, so if you prefer one over the other, here's your chance. Or

maybe you want both.

Please note that the shutdown and power off option will only power off **ATX motherboards**. Nearly all modern motherboards are this type. Otherwise you will get the "Safe to power off" message when execution is complete.

Create web pages in Word

You can create web pages using Word. Start a new page by clicking on File and New. Then, select Web Page Templates and Web Page Wizard. Answer the questions in the Wizard's dialog boxes and — in less than one minute — you will have created a web page template! Just plug your text in the places where it is indicated. Or, you can convert an existing document to a web page. Go to File and Save As. Click the down arrow next to Document Type and select web page.

Quick shortcut to remove Word's formatting

HAL's 7 programs

I know,

The ones I will review do not represent the entire field but only those that have a free "try before you buy" program and seemed the most viable.

a couple of issues ago I promised I would go over the programs I use on Hal, but I got sidetracked. I have spent most of my computer time reviewing (read: playing with) backup programs and disk imaging programs. I will go over them in terms of how they work on MY computer and how I liked them. This is not an unbiased review as I have very strict wants and some different hardware than many of you.

My first requirement is that the program works for me on HAL and gives a verifiable backup. It must work flawlessly every time. I cannot afford to have my backups flawed or failed to restore exactly as it was prior to the backup. Second is ease of use, preferably unattended. Third is speed, important but not too high on the list as I like to turn the program on and go to bed. The backup should be ready in the morning. Also wanted is a disaster recovery program which would restore from a cold boot to an empty hard drive.

Also they should work with my DVD plus writer, not all do, even though they say they do. As I mentioned last time, I do not want to back up to a removable hard drive or use tape backups. I want to have random access to the files, not sequential. So far no one program has met all the conditions I have set. Some did come close though. I immediately disregarded those programs that would not write or read from my DVD drive.

The ones I will review do not represent the entire field but only those that have a free "try before you buy" program and seemed the most viable. They will be covered in no particular order. I am not organized enough to list by preference.

Stomp (Veritas) Backup MYPC works well. It is fast and accurate, and will write to almost any device. There is a disaster recovery utility that worked well in Windows98, flawed in WindowsMe, and does not work, according to Stomp, "with the version of SP1 you are running".

NTI Backup Now 3 and Drive Backup 3 are two programs that work together. Backup Now is a somewhat slow backup with only one lever of compression. It will write to DVD Plus and Dash as well as to CDs. Drive Backup is a stand alone disk imaging program. It will write to HD, CD, and DVD. It is a little slow and has rather skimpy documentation. These programs work in windows and skip some files consistently, although they appear to be mainly log type files.

Avantrix Backup Plus will write a verified backup to all removable media . DVD and CD must be formatted for packet writing. No provision for disaster recovery other than reinstall Windows XP and Backup Plus and then restore. Slow running and has only a fixed compression.

PowerQuest Drive Image 7 has just been released in June. It will create image files for all drives including the boot drive while in Windows. It works fine to my HD, and will cold boot with the original CD from PowerQuest. It will not write to my CDs or DVD although others report it working fine. It requires packet writing ability from your drive but will format the disk as needed. I tried writing to a HD and then copying to a DVD, both through Nero and also InCD. DI 7 could not read the files.

PowerQuest Drive Image 6 (2002) reverts to Caldera DOS to create image files. It will write to CD but not DVD. You can write to a HD in 600meg blocks and then copy to DVD. Using the boot disks you make you can boot with Caldera DOS and then restore from DVD. The same files can be restored individually from the DVD using Image Explorer. Works.

Acronis True Image came highly recommended but did not produce consistent results for me. It would produce an Image file that could not always be restored. It has an explorer function that allows restoration of individual files. I did not work with this one much to try to find the dependability problem as the documentation was rather poor. The program runs entirely in Windows.

Terabyte Unlimited offers both Image for Windows and Image for DOS. I really only glanced at this as it looked rather complex to set up and there are so many other choices out there.

Which program will I settle on? I do not know. I am still checking out more programs and have not yet found one that meets all my requirements. At the present I have DVD backup sets from NTI Drive Backup (Image), NTI Backup now (file backup), Backup MyPC. Drive Image 6. Stay tuned for future developments.

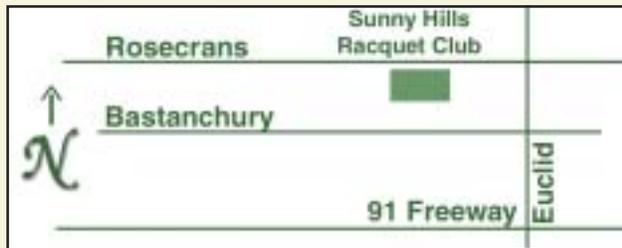
