dish in front of it. Once all of the items are displayed, we will name each vendor and give a brief description of each donated item.

Ticket sales should start around 7:30 p.m. Tickets are one dollar apiece. There are two pieces to each ticket. Put one side of the ticket in the bowl and keep the stub. Please keep your hold stubs intact as it makes easier to check

the numbers for winners. Members can put as many tickets as they choose into the bowls in front of each item. All tickets need to be deposited into the bowls by 8 p.m.

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Entry Level Questions Answered

Q: Can I change the words under my Desktop Icons? How about the color behind the words? Also, can I make the words bigger so I can read them?

A: Yes you can change the wording. One way is to RIGHT click the icon and select RENAME. Another is to LEFT click the name twice, in slow succession—at least two seconds between each click—or you'll launch the program associated with the icon. The name will change to a box showing the entire name and be highlighted in BLUE. Use the ARROW keys to position the cursor where you want to insert new text and start typing. While the text is BLUE, pressing the BACKSPACE key will remove all the current text. Then just type new text, keeping in mind there is a limited amount of characters that will display when your finish, and press the ENTER key.

To make the color behind the words different, do this. In the CONTROL PANEL access the DISPLAY and double click it. Select APPEARANCE. Look in the lower half of the open DISPLAY PROPERTIES window for the ITEM: and the word DESKTOP should be there. If not, select it. Then off to the right is the COLOR: selection. The current color shown is what you see as the color behind the desktop words; change the color to suit your desire.

To make the desktop icons text bigger, while still in the DISPLAY PROPERTIES window, select ICON in the ITEM: window. Notice just below is the FONT: setting window? Select a larger font than the default SIZE 8,

click APPLY and see if it's the size you want. If not, change it until it is.

Q: What is a Folder? Can I create new folders with my own titles? How do I move files in and out of folders? Can I get rid of folders I don't need?

A: A folder is much like the manila folder you may use for storing your monthly receipts and bills. Each folder contains different information in your file cabinet. Each folder in your computer also has different information that has been placed there.

Folders can be created with whatever title the user wants.

NOTE: A computer folder may contain the same information that exists in other folders—if the information has been COPIED there. Each system has some folders that are named the same—like WINDOWS, PROGRAM FILES, etc. just as some homes have the same folders found in everyone's file cabinet—i.e. PUBLIC SERVICE, GREELEY GAS, TELEPHONE. Folders contain program files, data files and files used to support a program—like WORD is a program file that has DLL and COM files to support the WORD program when it is executed.

Folders can be created with whatever title the user wants. For example, to create a folder named

TEST on the C: drive, several methods can be utilized to accomplish this. Right click MY COMPUTER and select EXPLORE when the drop-down menu appears. Now click ONCE on the C: drive ICON. Now, go up to the menu bar and select FILE | NEW | FOLDER. A new folder ICON is created and now you can just type the name you want. When the name of the folder is BLUE and highlighted, just typing text causes the name to change to the newly typed text.

To remove a folder, click it once to highlight it, then press the DEL key on the keyboard. You have just deleted the folder and ALL THE CONTENTS of the folder. So, be sure what is in the folder, if anything is there, is not wanted. Once you have deleted the folder, all the files and folders within that folder go away as well.

Q: What are the functions of the Windows key?

A: The WINDOWS key is an additional key found on certain

keyboards that allows the user to select functions without having to use the normal, multiple, keystrokes to accomplish a task. The functionality of the keyboard WINDOWS key is implemented when the OS recognizes the special keyboard and installs the special drivers, or by manually installing the special drivers that came with the system.

Here is a list of the shortcuts assigned to the WINDOWS key.

Press the WINDOWS KEY and The START menu will be displayed
WINDOWS KEY + PAUSE opens the SYSTEM PROPERTIES dialog (Key may be named PAUSE/BREAK)
WINDOWS KEY + TAB toggles the

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Recycling PC Components and Paraphenalia — Part 1

I am a recycling zealot. In this article, and others to follow, I hope to show you some good reasons for paying close attention to what you can recycle, and how easy and fun it can be to do something that's beneficial to this wonderful yet delicate planet's ecosystem. I'm convinced that this behavior really "scales up." For example, if just one more person shifts from tossing all their used floppies or CDs in the trashcan to keeping them in a box under the desk and recycling them properly, well then, that's real and measurable progress.

I wasn't always so zealous about recycling. Sure, I would dutifully put material into our local disposal service's recycling bin, standard stuff like glass, plastic, and paper. Then one day I was driving around downtown Hermosa Beach and spied a large banner posted up above the street. The banner promoted an upcoming Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) drop-off event in my neighborhood, so I called the listed phone number and quickly learned how many other types of items I could be recycling: expired or unused medicines, batteries, household cleaners, art supplies, electronics, and many others. It was a revelation to me how pervasive HHW is, and how easy it is to properly dispose of it.

But I'm getting ahead of myself, since this article's focus is on recyclable PC-related media: CDs, floppy diskettes, and other magnetic media. (I'll cover other PC-related recyclable items in subsequent issues.)

For about a year I've been accumulating CDs—old CDs, outdated CDs, coasters, broken CDs, you name it—in a plastic box under my desk. I wanted to properly recycle these along with some old floppy diskettes and magnetic tapes that have been sitting in the attic for a few years. Here's where I turned: GreenDisk, the makers of high quality recycled diskettes and CD-R disks. Not only does the firm manufacture recycled media products, it offers a recycling program for these media.

Courtesy of GreenDisk's Web site, here are some interesting facts—some are SHOCKING—about what happens to failed and surplus diskettes. We throw away 3-4 million diskettes daily, which equates to 1 BILLION per year. Ouch. When sitting in a landfill, a diskette takes about 450 years to decompose, and while doing so threatens to leach oxides into the local water table. (I calculate 450 years at between six and seven generations. What a heartbreaking gift we bequeath to our children, grandchildren, and so on if we don't arrest this

squandering of resources.)

Here's how GreenDisk's recycling program works for end users and small companies. (Large corporations also trust their tons of expired and/or obsolete software to GreenDisk for recycling, including Microsoft, Boeing, the U.S. State Department, and the FAA.) You simply ship 3.5" diskettes (they don't handle 5.25" diskettes), magnetic tapes, CDs, and videotapes to their recycling facility in Columbia,

Missouri, paying a minimum \$5.00 fee for up to 50 pounds and \$0.10/pound over 50 pounds. That's an extremely reasonable fee for the value of this service to our economy and ecology. <http://www.TheNakedPC.com/t/420/tr.cgi?lee2>

I personally just sent them a six pound shipment. I encourage you to consider doing the same with your used media. Thank you.

According to GreenDisk's web site, "The media is magnetically erased, fully inspected and evaluated. The disks and CDs are then disassembled and the plastic and metal components are recycled to make new disks and other items. The tapes are de-labeled, cleaned, packaged and resold." As of GreenDisk's second anniversary, it reports it has recycled nearly 20 million pounds of software materials and over 20 million diskettes.

Furthermore, GreenDisk says it recycles or reuses over 99.5% of the



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materials it receives for recycling. According to David Beschen, President, "We degauss magnetic media at a level that's four times stronger than the Department of Defense requirement. Our primary concern is protection of corporate and individual intellectual property."

Upon receipt of your shipment, an authorized GreenDisk staff member signs a Certificate of Destruction that states, "This certifies that all materials received by GreenDisk Services on [date] have been recycled in an environmentally sound and secure manner and the intellectual property contained on the disks, CDs or tapes has been destroyed."

Beschen says, "We in the U.S. have been conscientious about how we recycle paper and similar products. At GreenDisk we think it's important to make it 'free and easy' for folks to recycle computer media too. It's also important to have recyclers deliver something back, as we do with our existing recycled diskette and CD-R disk products." Windows XP launch lacks excitement

The launch of Windows XP has come and gone. I do not know how many of you went to the launch or the Microscope Xtreme event a few days before, but I noticed a lack of excitement compared to previous events. This is especially true when compared with the "Midnight Madness" of the Windows 95 event. There was a "midnight Madness" held at a very few CompUSA stores around the country, but all reports indicate these were not very successful. Merchandise went on sale in a number of stores at 9:00 or 10:00 PM instead of midnight, and those showing up at midnight expecting to get free gifts found them already given out.

WPA (Windows Program Activation) appears to be more of an aggravation to those who

are not running Windows XP than to those using it. Many of the reports, scare stories and

imagined threats to privacy are obviously put out by those who have never tried Windows XP or have even seen it. The Microsoft bashers are having a field day without any basis in fact. "I hate Microsoft, so don't confuse me with facts."

Speaking of Microsoft haters, the Linux crowd dutifully hails every announcement of a company changing its servers to Linux as a loss to Microsoft. They carefully fail to note the change is not from Windows but from Unix. The driving reason for the change is that Unix capable equipment costs multiples of Linux capable ones. Also, there is almost no significant learning curve and associated costs.

Back to Windows XP. Now that the retail version (gold) has reached the stores many companies have released patches or new versions of their software to work with Windows XP. Also many updated drivers are available. Creative Labs has released new Sound Blaster drivers for a number of their cards, to mixed reports. SB Live still seems to be a problem. Interestingly enough, Roxio, who wrote the CD writing software built into Windows XP, has delayed the patches needed to make Direct CD work with Windows XP. They apparently found a bug just days before shipping. Take Two is totally gone. It will not work with Windows XP and has been removed from the next version 5.1 although it is present in version 5.02a. Ahead software has updated Nero Burning ROM to 5.5.5 and InCD add-on to be compatible with XP. InCD is a packet writing utility similar to Direct CD but the two formats are not interchangeable. Veritas has released one patch and another is expected shortly to update Backup Exec 8.6 (NT version).

Corel WordPerfect 9 (WordPerfect Office 2000), with service packs 1, 2, and 3 works perfectly (pun intended) in XP, although Dragon Naturally Speaking has some problems. Since L and H is in financial trouble this may never be fixed. However WordPerfect 10 (2002) has major problems with XP and I could only

get it to run by forcing compatibility mode for Windows 98. SP1 has been released but did not fix the problem, and SP 2 is due "shortly" according to Corel.

Windows XP, in both the Home and Pro editions, is available in OEM versions for as low as \$87 for the Home version, and \$139 for the Pro one. You must also buy hardware with these, but it can be almost anything ranging from a power Y cable, to a memory stick (Fry's) to a full system. You will receive no support from Microsoft on an OEM, but must depend on the vendor for support. Also support is available online in the many usenet newsgroups devoted to aspects of Windows XP. If this interests you check out www.pricewatch.com. These will still have to be activated.

Plus for XP is released at \$39.95. Frankly I think it is worth about \$10. It has three 3D games, and two of these are freeware versions with upgrades available to be purchased. The same holds true for the screen savers, the best being Aquarium. It comes with three fish. A freeware version is available with one fish, 3 cost \$9.95 and seven \$19.95. This is from www.fish-byte.com. The CD label maker is basic and either Avery Media (available free with CD/DVD label packs) or the software available from the label makers is more feature laden. My rating: Overpriced shareware disk.

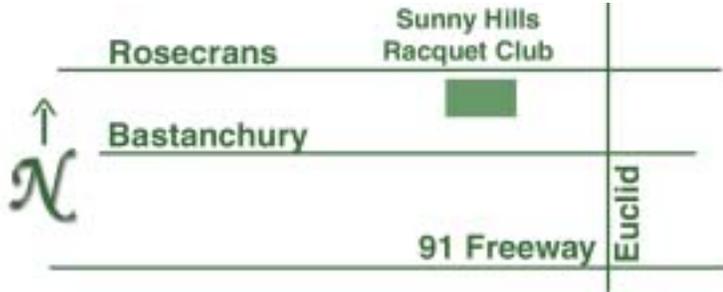
