Annual Christmas raffle is here with big prizes!

As you know, the Christmas raffle is the club's only fundraising activity of the year. Our move to Hunt Library, and publishing an award-winning newsletter and web site have all taken a bite out of our treasury. So we hope everyone will attend this meeting—and don't forget your wallets and purses.

Rules of the raffle

As in the past, this is the only meeting of the year that you must be a member to participate. To be sure your dues are paid, check the address label of this newsletter and it will show you the last date your membership is active. Also, wear your badge as it has your club membership number on it and we need that number to track prize winners.

We will try to have all of the raffle items out on display by as close to 6:30 p.m. as we can. Each item will have a yellow sticky with a number on it

(corresponding to the number on the raffle insert page) and a dish in front of it. Once all of the items are displayed, we will name each vendor and give a brief description of each product. Afterwards, we will begin selling raffle tickets.

Ticket sales should start around 7:30 p.m. Tickets are one dollar apiece. There are two pieces to each ticket. Put one side of the ticket in a bowl and keep the stub. Members may put as many tickets as they choose in the bowls in front of each item. All tickets need to be deposited into the bowls by 8 p.m.

At 8 p.m., we will check the bowls and add "ORCOPUG" tickets to any bowl with less than five tickets until the count hits five. An "ORCOPUG" ticket will be a different color for easy identification. If a club ticket is drawn, the club wins the prize and it is set aside for the monthly raffle. 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

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Program's upgrade problems are never ending

Last year I upgraded from Girlfriend 7.0 to Wife 1.0 and noticed that the new program began unexpected child processing that took up a lot of space and valuable resources. No mention of this phenomenon was included in the product brochure.

In addition, Wife 1.0 installs itself into all other programs and launches during system initialization, where it monitors all other system activity.

Applications such as Poker Night 10.3, Drunken Boys Night 2.5 and Saturday Football 5.0 no longer run, crashing the system whenever selected.

I cannot seem to keep Wife 1.0 in the background while attempting to run some of my other favorite applications. I am thinking about going back to Girlfriend 7.0 but the uninstall does not work on this program.

Can you help me, please?

Dear Joe:

This is a very common problem men complain about but is mostly due to a primary misconception. Many people upgrade from Girlfriend 7.0 to Wife 1.0 with the idea that Wife 1.0 is merely a *Utilities and Entertainment* program.

Wife 1.0 is an *Operating System* and designed by its creator to run everything. It is unlikely you would be able to purge Wife 1.0 and still convert back to Girlfriend 7.0. Hidden operating files within your system

would cause Girlfriend 7.0 to emulate Wife 1.0, so nothing is gained. It is impossible to uninstall, delete or purge the program files from the system once installed. You cannot go back to Girlfriend 7.0 because Wife 1.0 is not designed to do this.

I might also suggest you read the entire section regarding General Partnership Faults (GPFs). You must assume all responsibility for faults and problems that might occur, regardless of their cause. The best course of action will be to enter the command C:\APOLOGIZE. (Avoid excessive use of the Esc key because ultimately you will have to give the APOLOGIZE command before the operating system will return to normal.) Wife 1.0 is a great program, but very high maintenance.

Buy additional software to improve Wife 1.0 performance. I recommend Flowers 2.1 and Chocolates 5.0.

Do not, under any circumstances, install Secretary With Short Skirt 3.3. This is not a supported application for Wife 1.0 and is likely to cause irreversible damage to the operating system.

"Computer mishaps happen to all of us. A new screen saver wrecks your display settings... That new shareware program decides to alter your config.sys and autoexec.bat without bothering to tell you... You install a new game and the rest of your applications stop working..."

Let's face it, it is impossible to predict when you are going to push the wrong button and suddenly end up looking at The Blue Screen of Death. But, fortunately, now there's hope! PowerQuest gives you a "SecondChance."

When a system is impaired due to a system conflict, configuration errors, buggy software, data corruption, or simple user error, SecondChance from PowerQuest, allows you to automatically and safely restore your system back to an earlier point in time when the PC worked great. And it does this without time-consuming backup tapes and restore programs.

Here's how it works:

1. SecondChance takes "Checkpoints," which are snapshots of your system, at user-specified points in time.
2. These checkpoints are created automatically, by a built-in scheduler or manually, whenever you want.



Thus readeth the blurb for Second Chance that I received by e-mail in September. I was going somewhere and did not take the time to consider buying it at that time. When I got home again I forgot about it until it was offered for review in a club meeting. It seemed like something that I have been needing because every now and then my computer goes whacko and through Scandisk, Safe Mode, etc. I go to get it operating again. If I could simply restore the settings to when it worked properly, life would be a lot easier.

Installation

Since I have lots of software on my hard disk and have partitioned it to get reasonable FAT sectors, I



decided it would be wise to do some clean-up. I got rid of some files that I couldn't see any reason to save, defragmented all partitions, and checked the free space to see if C: was within the parameters given in the Readme file. In proceeding to install, I heeded the warning to close other Windows programs (I wish I could remember to do that before I put in the disk). When asked if I wanted to read the latest breaking news in the Readme file I, of course, clicked on Yes. Thinking that it would be good to have that on hand while installing, I tried to print it. Much to my surprise the computer rebooted. The reboot worked fine and brought up a "splash" screen that suggested that I make a Emergency Boot Disk. This I did, adding it to my collection of Emergency Boot Diskettes.

Operation

A counter-clockwise blue arrow appeared in the tool bar at the bottom. Right clicking on this brings up a small selection screen with "Open Second Chance" and "Create a New Checkpoint." Since a Checkpoint had already been created, I left clicked on "Open Second Chance" and got a selection box replete with tabs and various options which include: Control tab, Restore Drives, Create new checkpoint, and View drives.

Inasmuch as I didn't need either of the first two, I selected the third and got a screen that allows you to view the trees on the drives and the changes made thereto.

Options tab: Allows a user to change limits for file space usage and add or remove drives (to those included in the Checkpoint). Here I chose the first, reducing the amount

Bug Report

If one attempts to run Norton Utilities version 3.0,4.0 or 4.5 (2000) under Windows95/98 you may see the error message "Invalid File Extension". This may occur after installing Office2000 and then running Norton's WinDoctor. The problem is a result if Office2000 was installed to run off the CD. Using this method Office2000 will prompt the user when the CD is needed to read certain files and Office2000 will run without a problem. However WinDoctor finds entries in the Windows registry for these CDROM based files but can not find them on the hard disk. It therefore reports a problem. The workaround is to set WinDoctor to ignore these entries. If you have already had WinDoctor fix what you believed were errors, you may have lost some registry entries and may have to reinstall Office2000 to make it run properly.

One must always be aware of the possible threat of viruses. Two new ones have been in the news lately. The 'BubbleBoy' virus is a new type that does not require the user to open an attachment. Instead one simply has to open an email message. An embedded Visual Basic script command then attaches itself to the

Outlook address book and sends a message to everyone in the address book. The virus is considered a low threat as it has only been emailed to anti-virus vendors and the major anti-virus vendors have received no reports of infection by customers.

Microsoft had released a patch for the "scriptlet.typeLib/Eyedog" security last month. This patch also prevents the 'BubbleBoy' virus running. The patch is available from: <http://www.microsoft.com/msdownload/iebuild/scriptlet/en/scriptlet.htm>. This virus or worm is more of a nuisance than anything, as it does not carry code that could damage someone's computer.

Another virus called W32.FunLove.4099 affects Windows95/98 and WindowsNT machines. It infects applications with EXE SCR or OCX extensions. When such a file is opened or run the virus will create a background process that continues to replicate. What happens with WindowsNT computers is that it is able to corrupt the permission checking process enabling it to infect the rest of the network. Both McAfee www.mcafee.com VirusScan and Symantec's www.symantec.com Norton AntiVirus have released updates.

Since we are on the topic of viruses, Microsoft announced that it is working with leading antivirus firms to provide free, fully functional anti-virus software to companies, small businesses and consumers. The software is 90 day trial versions and was available starting November 1 through to December 31, 1999.

According to MS web site "Microsoft is focusing on a growing concern that there is the potential for viruses and hoaxes to be a problem around the changeover to the Year 2000" and is providing this service.

of disk space on C: reserved for use by Second Chance.

Checkpoint Space tab: Shows current checkpoint dates, times and space the checkpoint file occupies and the available Checkpoint space.

Schedule tab: Settings here allow you to automate the creation of new checkpoint files by selecting the day and time desired.

Online tab: Provides options to register online, update, or visit the Powerquest web site.

The documentation booklet is minimal, but the help screens are clear, understandable, and appear complete. One salutary discovery upon subsequently working with other software is that Second Chance will remove the Checkpoint file if it gets in the way of other computer operations. I was scanning the text from Powerquest for inclusion in this document and it first advised me of the limited disk space, then removed the checkpoint file upon my OK allowing the scan to proceed.

I don't know if this is a "sleeper," but it appears well thought out and designed for a useful purpose. Windows seems to need all the help it can get and Second Chance, assuming it proves to be as good over an extended period as other Powerquest software, could well save some hours of getting the computer operating properly again.

Office 2000 not entirely compatible with older versions

If you are thinking of upgrading to Office 2000, read these qualifiers from Microsoft first. Although you probably will still decide to install Office 2000, you will be prepared for the inevitable side effects. http://www.microsoft.com/office/ork/2000/four/67t2_1.htm.

Microsoft's web site says Office 2000 users can collaborate with users of other versions of Office, as well as other software applications. But, previous versions of Office do not support all Office 2000 features. During the conversion process, some features and formatting might be changed or lost.

For instance, Microsoft Excel 2000 has the same file format as Excel 98 (Macintosh) and Excel 97 (Windows), but it has a few enhancements because of the new features included in Excel 2000. The Excel 95 and Excel 5.0 file formats are different from Excel 2000.

Cleanup your hard drive in four easy steps

Maintain your hard drive by performing these steps at least monthly, in this order:

- 1.) Delete all files and folders with dates older than one week from C:\WINDOWS\TEMP.
- 2.) Purge your browser's history and Internet cache files.
- 3.) Run ScanDisk. Select the Standard radio button and enable Automatically Fix Errors. Click on Advanced and, under Log File, pick Replace Log; for Cross-Linked Files, select Delete; click Free under Lost File Fragments; under Check Files For, check "Invalid dates and times;" and disable "Check host drive first," unless you've compressed your hard drive.
- 4.) Empty the Recycle Bin.

How to print a folder list

It's hard to get a folder listing in Windows. There is an easy way to do it in, you should excuse the expression, DOS.

Click on Start, Programs, MS-DOS Prompt. Navigate to the directory of your choice using the CD command. Type *cd/?* and press Enter.

In the directory of your choice, type in the command *dir* and press Enter to see the directory on the screen. Use switches to control the information displayed. At the DOS prompt, type *dir/?* and press Enter.

If you want to create a file, you must transfer the directory listing to a

file. Use the redirect function. Type *dir > dir.txt* and press Enter using any DIR command switches.

You can print from the file you just created by using the redirect function or the PRINT command. Type *dir.txt > prn* or *dir.txt . lpt1* or *print dir.txt* and press Enter.

You can send the directory listing directly to the printer. Type *dir > prn* or *dir > lpt1* using any DIR command switches.

You can also print a directory of a given folder in Windows by navigating in Explorer to the folder which lists the file you have just created. Right-click the file *dir.txt*. Click Print on the context menu.

Rename any document quickly and easily

There is a simple way to rename any document you create in Windows 95 and 98. Here's how:

1. If you have a My Documents icon on your Desktop, double-click on it and go to Step 3. (If the My Documents icon isn't on your Desktop, follow Step 2.)
2. Right click on the Start button. Left

click on Explore. Use the center vertical scroll bar between the Explorer windows and scroll *up* to the folder called My Documents. Double click to open it. Go to Step 3.

3. Locate the file you want to rename and right click on it.

4. Left click Rename on the drop-down list.

5. Type a new name for the file in the blue highlighted area in the box, and press the Enter key on the keyboard. (If the extension—a period and three letters—could be seen in the original file name, be sure you type it again after the new file name.)

URL

(Universal Resource Locator)

Pronounced earl, it is a standardized naming, or "addressing," system for documents and media accessible over the Internet.

For example, the URL <http://www.orcopug.org/news.html> includes the standard for the exchange of information (*http*—Hypertext Transfer Protocol), the address of the computer on which it can be found (www.orcopug.org), the name of the document (*news*), and the language in which the document is written (*html*, or Hypertext Markup Language).

Lately I have been asked about my naming my computers, and about my philosophy in building and operating them. However, before I go into that, I want to correct a URL. The correct URL for downloading Windows 98 updates is <http://www.microsoft.com/windows98/downloads/corporate.asp>. Last time I left out the Windows98.

Also, the patch for Windows 98 SE shutdown problems has been updated, so if the first patch did not help try the new one. I can't comment on this since I haven't had that problem.

I have been naming computers since back in the days I was running a TI 99/4A and a C64. At that time I was writing about using TI Writer (later to become Word) and Funnelweb Writer (don't ask, if you were into TI you would know). It was just easier to write about HAL than about a computer. Later it became a game. Actually HAL was formalized when I obtained my first 286 SX/25.

Having been a fan of Arthur Clarke since I was a teenager, HAL was a natural for a computer that, at times, seemed to have a mind of its own. Of course, the sheer coincidence, per Clarke, of HAL being one letter lower than IBM may have had some influence also. Anyway the name has persisted and really came into use when I started writing about several different computers in one

article. Can you imagine how dull reading about computer #1 and computer #2 would be, especially after reading about HAL and Barbie.

Barbie is relatively new, only a couple of years old. The name came about when I assembled a computer for my granddaughters to use when they were visiting. They complained about having to take turns, and pressed for a second computer. I built Barbie out of spare parts, and especially out of a motherboard and CPU that I had leftover from a rebuild of my son's computer. This was needed because a non-functioning "Talk to me Barbie" game. After all, who can resist the pleas of two young granddaughters to play their new game. Well, with a background like that, the name Barbie was a natural.

Both HAL and Barbie have undergone several permutations in their lives. HAL is currently a 233 MMX that thinks it is a 266MMX (overclocked bus). Barbie is now a 200MMX that is not overclocked since the Tyan motherboard will not allow it.

Why overclock?

As some of you already know, I overclock whenever I can. Why? Because I can. These are my toys and I will play with them any way I want.

Do I recommend overclocking? No. It is not for the inexperienced or the faint of heart. It is also not for a machine that you depend on for mission critical work. If you overclock, you must understand the workings of the machine, how to

troubleshoot, how to go back to the last level that worked, and also must be willing to risk killing components.

Now my experience with overclocking goes back to the days when we pulled 4 MHz crystals from the motherboard and replaced them with 8 MHz ones, or later pulled 8 MHz and installed 12 MHz.

We also had some with "turbo" switches to change between crystals. This was needed because a number of programs would not run at the "high" speed setting. By the way, the turbo switch on your PC does the same speed switching, but it changes the RC network and timing functions rather than crystals. But back then we did not know how to make this work correctly. Crystals were easier, and info about them (part numbers, frequency, etc.) could be exchanged by Fidonet while the RC network could only be diagrammed and sent by snail mail if you had an address to use.


I have heard many stories about how overclocking will shorten the life of your CPU, but I have never had a CPU die, nor a motherboard fail because of overclocking. In fact, the PC that my daughter is using in Santa Rosa is about four plus years old. It was an early HAL, and then given to her when I upgraded. It is an Intel Zappa motherboard with a 75 MHz Pentium running at 125 MHz with a multiplier that is raised.

New CPUs from Intel now have their multipliers locked, so you must play with the bus speeds and sometimes core voltages in order to

information and links, at the bottom of the web page: <http://www.microsoft.com/y2k/antivirus/AntiVirus.htm>.

I have only used McAfee and Symantec's virus scanners. PLEASE PLEASE PLEASE if you already have a virus scanner or if you install one of these 90 day trial version update your virus definition files on a REGULAR basis! I have seen people with definition files that are 1 or 2 years out of date! These definitions are not providing you with very much protection. Even if you have just bought and installed a virus scanner recently its definition files are out of date! Follow the manufacturer's recommended procedure to update the definition files. McAfee and Symantec both release updates on a weekly basis and provide automated procedures via the Internet. Also you can have more than one virus scanning software installed on your computer at one time but MAKE SURE that you only have one of the programs scanning for viruses automatically. If you do not, you could get false alarms.


