Our world seems filled with destroyers. In one month, we've seen two of the worst. The bin Laden terrorists and the Nimda worm.

And, it seems that striking back at the perpetrators in both cases is problematic—if not impossible for Nimda.

Many IT professionals agree that it is “incredibly difficult to clean the (Nimda) worm from an infected system.”

Right now, while you're thinking of it, update your virus definitions and run your antivirus program. Then, turn off your shared network drives and folders (if you are networked to another computer). These are only general basics. If your computer is infected, please go to your antivirus maker's website and get further instructions.*

Although not on the same level as either the terrorists or the worm, there are some Word macro viruses which have been dealt a decisive blow. There are malicious macros that can be masked to evade Word's security alert so they can run automatically without your knowledge. But they can be blocked. Patches for three Word versions are available: Word 97—<http://office.microsoft.com/downloads/9798/wd97mcrcs.aspx>, Word 2000—<http://office.microsoft.com/downloads/2000/wd2kmsec.aspx>, Word 2002—<http://office.microsoft.com/downloads/2002/wrd1001.aspx>.

Keep in mind, however, that despite plugging one of Word's more serious security problems, it isn't the only one. Check often for updates, patches, and security tools at <http://office.microsoft.com> and <http://microsoft.com/technet/>

security/default.asp.

Don't allow your computer to become an unprotected target of cyberterrorists. Do all you can to protect your computer and data so you won't ever look back and say, “I wish I would have...”

Windows tip

How to convert email into a Word document

You may already know this Computer Word 97 or Word 2000 tip. I will explain what I do. (Many do not know this computer trick) A person at times may wish to format the e-mail to a full size Microsoft Word Document in order to make a copied text print out in full size to the right margin of the paper.

- In your Internet email, highlight only the part of the e-mail you want to be printed.
- While still highlighted push down with the right mouse key. A dialog box will appear on the monitor screen. Within this dialog box click on Copy. (This will make a copy onto a hidden computer clipboard.)
- Next open up a Microsoft Word Document 1. Paste the text from the e-mail on the hidden clipboard to Microsoft Document 1.

How to do this.

When Microsoft Document 1 is on your monitor screen, left click where you would normally start to type in a Microsoft Document 1.

- As soon as you see the cursor start to blink in Microsoft Document 1 push down on the right mouse key. A dialog box will appear on your monitor screen. Within this dialog box click on Paste. All the Text from the email highlighted and copied will now be in Microsoft Document 1.
- Next, at the top of the monitor screen at the toolbar, click on the icon Format. An AutoFormat dialog box will appear on the monitor screen.
- Within this Autoformat dialog box click in the small circle where it says "AutoFormat now."
- Next, within this same AutoFormat box, click on OK. The dialog box disappears and leaves your Document 1 as a full-page size.
- Click on your Printer Icon at the Tool Bar, for a nice, full -page print out.

Try it out when you need a full size text print out from an e-mail.

- PowerQuest announces version 7.0 of its popular PartitionMagic dynamic disk partitioning tool. In addition to its standard features of creating, resizing, merging, and converting partitions on your hard drive, version 7 has these new features: supports Windows XP, merge NTFS partitions, large drive support (up to 80 GB), access/partition external USB drives, and undelete a deleted partition from rescue disks. - HP announces that it is introducing new PCs loaded with Microsoft Windows XP starting Monday, September 24. HP is also following Gateway's lead in accepting pre-orders for custom systems starting September 21 (with Microsoft's blessing). Applications: Here to There — Part 2

In Part 1 I recounted the saga wherein I started out to migrate my working PC's programs and data to a bigger, faster system here in the Underground Labs. I was intrigued by a new product from the V Communications folks who brought us System Commander, it's called PC Upgrade Commander. As I had used and was impressed with System Commander, so I thought PC Upgrade Commander could be the answer we've all been looking for when migrating our "stuff" between PCs.

Sure, it's not hard to copy data from one PC to another via a null modem cable connection, or a network, or using a third party piece of software like LapLink (albeit the latter is a pricey way to go). But moving applications from one system to another is a nightmare ever since the Registry became the sanctum sanatorium for application information. I was also complicating the issue by wanting to move applications from Windows 98SE to Windows 2000, a situation that PC Upgrade Commander is supposed to handle with aplomb.

Before I get into the nitty gritty of my sojourn into the PC-to-PC transfer netherworld, let me get a mea culpa out of the way. Last issue I mentioned MagicMover, a utility that was part of the indispensable PartitionMagic program (made by PowerQuest). The operative word here being "was." It seems that the powers that be decided to drop MagicMover from PartitionMagic in version 6. Alas, I am still using version 5 and had assumed that something as useful as MagicMover would remain a part of PartitionMagic forever. This is, sadly, not the case. To all of you TNPCers who have been trying to find MagicMover in PartitionMagic version 6 I apologize, it's simply not there.

Fortunately, TNPCer Lewis L. not only set me straight but pointed me to PowerQuest's latest information about MagicMover. According to PowerQuest, "PM6's new Split Partition feature replaces the separate MagicMover utility that was included in earlier versions of PartitionMagic." Hmmm, having read the PartitionMagic Web site blurb on the Split Partition feature it does not sound much like MagicMover to me. It moves folders and applications between partitions, relies on DriveMapper to update shortcuts and the Registry, and they recommend you not fool with the Program Files folder at all. Given the way my Program Files folder grows I've wanted to relocate it to another drive for some time now.

In any event, we started out trying to move the contents of one PC to another, so did I discuss relocating programs on a single machine in the first place? The

answer is housecleaning. Like cleaning up and organizing your belongings before a move, it makes things easier when you get to your new place.

Remember, the traditional scenario is to start on the new computer with only the operating system and then reinstall all your programs from scratch. This gives you the opportunity to do major housecleaning and reorganization. In fact this is probably the one thing that makes the pain of reinstalling everything manually worthwhile. Note that manually reinstalling is still a viable, sometimes inescapable, method of migrating to a new computer.

But moving applications from one system to another is a nightmare ever since the Registry became the sanctum sanatorium for application information.

But my wanting to avoid reinstalling all my applications, which necessitates finding all the application disks, CDs, and/or downloaded program files, to say nothing of all the updates, upgrades, service releases, bug fixes, ad infinitum, along with resetting, calibrating, tweaking, and fine-tuning my programs... well, this is what led me to investigate migration software in the first place.

Here's how the migration process is supposed to work: all your applications and data are force-fed to the target computer, and the operating system's Registry is updated so it thinks all the copied applications have been installed on that computer all along and everything is supposed to run peachy-keen. That's the theory.

Since everything on the source PC

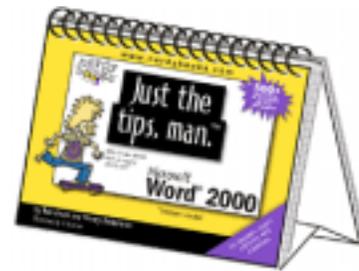

is dumped onto the target PC it pays to do some of your housecleaning *before* migrating to the target machine, and that's where a program relocation program comes in handy. Since MagicMover is no longer supplied with PartitionMagic, several TNPCers pointed me to an alternative freeware program called Change of Address (COA). The latest is COA2 version 1.0, written for Ziff Davis by Neil J. Rubenking. <http://www.TheNakedPC.com/t/418/tr.cgi?jim2>

COA2 works as advertised but you should be aware of some important caveats (these are explained in the documentation). COA2 does not actually move a program's folders or files. You have to relocate the program folder yourself then tell COA2 what folder you moved (showing a fully qualified path) and where exactly you moved it (again with a fully qualified path). Then COA2 goes into your Registry and shortcuts and swaps out the location strings to point to the new location. You have to do this one folder at a time so doing any serious housecleaning and reorganizing is a long, tedious chore (albeit much shorter and less tedious than tweaking the Registry and shortcuts manually too).

I had high hopes for PC Upgrade Commander. V Communications staff told me the next version would deal with the issue of copying unneeded drivers from one PC to the other and that they were working on giving the user a way to selectively transfer applications. Sounds sweet. Unfortunately, so far I've been unable to get PC Upgrade Commander to work. Installation was a snap. When I started the application on the target and source PCs they recognized each other over my test network, and the migration process would start properly. But at step 3 of 3 it consistently failed with a message box, "Target is busy. Press Stop." Stop it did, but with no migration accomplished.

Technical support engineers ran through their checklist, "Is hibernation disabled?" (it was) and emailing me sections of the PDF manual (that I already had) so I'd know how to verify NetBEUI and TCP/IP protocols were installed on my computers (even though only TCP/IP is required for migrating across a network). Our email conversations quickly degenerated to gropes like, "Are you using CAT-5/UTP network cables?" and, "Somewhere in the 7 OSI network layer your system is incompatible with PC Upgrade Commander." Tech support came up with perhaps my DSL network card on the source PC was confusing the program. I'll run some tests and let you know how it ultimately works out (or doesn't). I was really dismayed to have problems with a V Communications program but I noticed on the Help About dialog that the copyright to Upgrade Commander is held by another company so V Communications did not develop it themselves.

I did hear from some TNPCers who have tried PC Upgrade Commander. Andrew J. said that after 12 hours of a projected 24 hours to complete the migration, the transfer aborted leaving him high and dry. Dave S. reports that he did a successful migration from Windows 98 to Windows ME over a parallel cable and moved a ton of data and programs with no glitches or problems.

Meanwhile, a number of The Naked PC readers make a strong case for a program called PC Relocator from a company with the unlikely but memorable name of AlohaBob. PC Relocator does not purport to work between disparate operating systems but is supposed to be fast and, according to these readers, works very well.

Next issue I'll conclude with a report on AlohaBob's PC Relocator.

Scorecard needed for Microsoft problems

Well, another month has flown by and it is time for another column. What shall we discuss this time?

Microsoft has released RC2 of Windows XP to about 500,000 people. That is counting only the legitimate recipients, the Beta Testers, MSDN subscribers and WPP members. That is not counting those who downloaded bootleg copies from a number of

sites. Yes, it is out there. In fact, it was available from these sites one to two days earlier than from the Conxion download site for WPP members. I am sure also that the product activation code has already been cracked. It was for the Betas.

Who is mad at Microsoft this week? That is, not counting the Department of Justice and the 18 states (remember one state has reached a compromise agreement).

Let's start with Sun Microsystems. First, they were upset because Microsoft included a modified Java Virtual machine in Windows 98. It was modified to make it work, but not under Sun's exclusive control. So they did the all-American thing: sue. Microsoft under court pressure withdrew their version and substituted the Sun mandated version. Script error abounded and Sun, very quietly repaired their code using almost the same changes Microsoft did. Now, in Windows XP, Microsoft is not including any Java Virtual Machine

support, although, if you want it, you can download it from either the Microsoft site or Sun's site. Sun is now crying foul because it is not supported. They are afraid that this will mean the end of Java. Be careful what you wish for, you just might get it.

AOL/Time Warner is upset. Microsoft originally planned for Windows XP to have a clean desktop. The only icon on the desktop natively is the Recycle Bin. They recently, for what appears to be political reasons, decided OEMs can put

anything they want on the desktop and modify the look. Compaq then entered a deal with AOL to exclusively put the link to AOL on the desktop in return for \$35 per machine sold that way. Microsoft then said "No way. If you put AOL on the desktop then you also MUST put MSN there too." Now AOL

is upset that they can not dictate what is on Microsoft's desktop.

Symantec has released Norton AntiVirus 2002 Beta 3. This trial version will run for 30 days, but can be upgraded to the next beta or full release, whichever comes first. It does work with all the Windows flavors out. If you are using NAV 2001 be sure to update your versions of both Live Update and Sevinst to the newest versions. With both of these patches it will work well with Windows XP.

Windows XP comes with a built-in firewall, or really a half firewall. It will prevent intrusions but will allow programs to call home. The latest versions of Zone Alarm Pro and Tiny firewalls work effectively but require turning off the built-in firewall in Windows XP. The best protection is still a hardware router.

Windows XP will be released for sale on October 25 barring a court injunction. Microsoft has already been pressuring the hardware and software manufacturers to pressure the government agencies to keep hands off. The rationale presented is based on the fear of a downturn in the computer industry if the new OS is not introduced in time for the holiday sales. This will, in turn, create an economic downturn in the country which could lead to a depression. They might even be right.

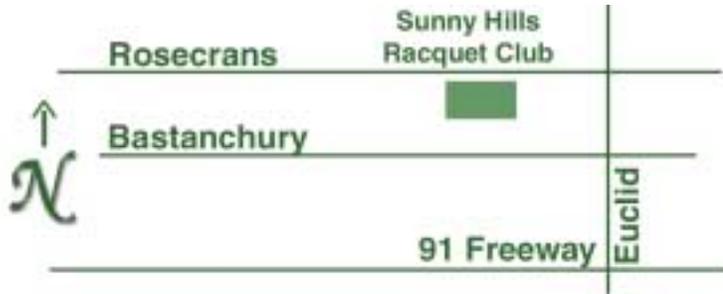
